

ilson Frost will long be remembered as the duly heir apparent first black
Chicago mayor from more than 4 decades ago and an iconic African-American politician of his time. A man of notable integrity, he came to prominence as a Chicago Alderman. First elected to office in 1967, he ran and won the seat for 21st Ward Alderman, and 4 years later won and remained 34th Alderman until his retirement. An astute representative serving nearly 20 years on the

City Council, his rise to president pro tempore in 1973 was accomplished in an impressive 6 years. He would tell the Chicago Tribune that he wanted to motivate others in his community to become involved in politics, stating "I hope this honor—and it is an honor—will suggest to young blacks that there are opportunities not only in business and the legal profession but in politics; that it will encourage them to work within the system."

After Mayor Richard J. Daley's death in 1976, Frost announced as the president pro tempore that he would be assuming the role of mayor. He

was unfortunately met with staunch resistance from Daley loyalists, and legend goes, the door to City Hall was locked to prevent Frost from symbolically taking Daley's desk and assuming the position of mayor. Several days thereafter, a deal would be accomplished that installed Alderman Michael Bilandic as Acting Mayor and President Pro Tempore Wilson Frost as Chairman of the Finance Committee, according to a Tribune report. As Finance Chairman, Frost was distinctly the highest ranking African-American alderman. Following this action, a first-time procedural succession plan would call for the council's vice mayor to serve as interim mayor. After leaving the City Council, Frost served as a Commissioner on the Cook County Tax Appeals Board until 1998. His substantial leadership is reflected by the many accolades from a vast array of colleagues, elected officials, mentees and citizens alike.

Former State Senate Leader Emil Jones Jr. worked for Frost as his aldermanic secretary in 1967, and caringly mused these words of wisdom, "He [Frost] would always say, 'Don't fatten frogs to feed snakes,' and 'Don't go out telling people how much you weigh. They'll find out once you get on the scale.'" And current Cook County Clerk David Orr reminisced, "Nevertheless, Frost continued to push for the advancement of African-Americans in politics. Frost was loyal to Harold Washington and played a critical role in getting him elected as the

city's first African-American mayor." Cook County Assessor Joseph Berrios remembered Frost as "a great friend." The two met when Berrios first went to work at the Board of Review when Frost was commissioner. At an earlier point in his career, Berrios said he thought he was going to be appointed 31st Ward Alderman but lost out. Frost offered words of encouragement, "Wilson told me back then, 'this may be a disappointment to you right now, but other things will open up," Berrios recalled. "He was absolutely correct. He was a great mentor." The two last saw each other two years ago before Frost moved to California. They met for lunch at Rosebud, a now-shuttered downtown restaurant. "He should've been Chicago's first black mayor," Berrios adoringly conveyed. And the junior statesman Alderman Roderick Sawyer pondered, "Wilson Frost will be remembered for having the courage to uphold the City

Council's own charter in the face of unprincipled and illegal opposition and maneuvering by his own Democratic Party members of the council. There was no reason other than straight-up racism for them to oppose him. His dignity when confronted with this reality was exemplary. He continued in public office for another two decades. A dedicated public servant who should have been the city's first Black mayor."

Cook County Judge Joel Greenblatt had known of Wilson's reputation and they met, became fast friends, practiced law together as partners for nearly two decades starting in the 1980s following their watching the Bears win Super Bowl XX in New Orleans. "He didn't get very low," Greenblatt said. "He was a true gentleman." He recalls upon Wilson's nearing retirement suggesting Greenblatt think about becoming a judge. "Get your nose under the tent and you'll make your own name for yourself. Then perhaps, they'll consider keeping you on the bench." Greenblatt also stated that "Frost never expressed disappointment over not becoming mayor." Alderman Carrie M. Austin noted Frost remained a mentor to black politicians even in recent years. She'd attended lunch with him and several younger aldermen, desiring they meet and be mentored by Frost. Austin's affiliation with Frost, whom she affectionately calls "the Godfather" and "the founder" of her political organization, was groomed decades ago at a time when her late husband Lemuel Austin worked directly with Frost. "As a young wife I got a little jealous and asked, 'what did he [Lemuel] do at that place?'" Lemuel responded, "If you want to know, you have to follow me." "So I did." Austin stated. "I volunteered my time." She told Frost she was a new volunteer and he learned that she was Lemuel's wife. "I wouldn't have a career if it wasn't for his wisdom and guidance," Austin contemplates. "He has been the legacy we've tried our best to uphold." Austin likewise credits Frost for his Machiavellian foresight and said she will continue to preserve his legacy by passing on Frost's wisdom to a new generation of black politicians in the city. Both Austin's later joined the City Council, and Frost remained their mentor. He no longer called Austin "Carrie," he called her daughter. Also celebrated among the ranks of Frost's politico daughters was Cook County Commissioner Deborah Sims for over 20 years. And Attorney Tony Bass was counted a Frost politico son. Frost was likewise praised by the Reverend Jesse Jackson as a disciplined, intelligent man who served the city and his ward well. He said Wilson Frost would have made "a fine mayor" or even governor. "He was ready," Jackson candidly expressed. "The machine wasn't ready." Alderman Ed Burke's reminiscence of Frost

reflected on his law firm negotiating the "peace treaty" that ultimately named Bilandic mayor and installed Frost as Finance Committee Chairman. Burke, who now chairs the Finance Committee summed up his former colleague's charisma warmly. "He lived a rich and full life with many accomplishments, and he'll be remembered as a trailblazer," Burke recollected. There's a following of younger politicians who similarly credit Frost's leadership for their successes.

"Wilson Frost was an iconic, larger than life public servant whose influence cannot be overstated," Emil Jones said. "Many have come before and many will come after, but Wilson Frost will always be remembered as someone who lived and breathed the 34th Ward and entire City of Chicago."





Pappas: \$94 Million in property tax refunds available on new website

<u>Cookcountytreasurer.com</u>. The money is unclaimed even though since 2009 nearly \$544 million in overpayments has been refunded or prevented by the Treasurer's Office.

Because refund claims often are disputed among different payers, including mortgage companies, banks, buyers and sellers, the application requires proof that the refund applicant paid the taxes.

Pappas has revamped <u>cookcountytreasurer.com</u> so that property owners can now search by address as well as Property Index Number (PIN) and get an instantaneous response for available refunds going back 20 years.

The redesigned site puts key information about your property in a single place. To see if you are entitled to a refund, go to the website:

- Select "Your Property Tax Overview"
- Search by address or by Property Index Number (PIN)
- Look for the results under "Are There Any Overpayments on Your PIN?"
- Complete the online application if you believe you are entitled to a refund

Chicago residents, Households danger of eviction, homelessness or foreclosure and currently experiencing homelessness are eligible for the program.

- Householder my receive no more than once instance of assistance(\$2,500 depending on need) during 24-month period
- Payments can't exceed 2 or 3 months of rent or mortgage arrears
 - Utility bills can be paid up to the cap of \$2,500, but clients should focus on what it will cost to stop the shut-off and get on a payment plan



Smart Lighting Update

Today marked a milestone in the City's ambitious project to convert nearly 300,000 streetlights to LED. Crews are wrapping up work on the West Side, having completed installation of more than 42,000 streetlight fixtures. They will now shift to residential and arterial streets on the South Side. The new lights use half as much energy as the old ones. It will save Chicago taxpayers \$135 million over the next decade. Theyed are also manufactured in Chicago. The City is leveraging investments in neighborhoods to create manufacturing jobs for Chicago residents. There is a public safety component to the new lights as well. Streets and alleys that are well-lit deter crime, whereas streets and alleys in the dark can encourage it. Finally, the new system automatically notifies the City when a light goes out, so scheduling crews out there to replace it immediate. The days of having to call 311 when a streetlight burns out will soon be a thing of the past.

State Homeless Prevention Funds

What is the State Homeless Prevention Program?

The State Homeless Prevention Program provides financial a mortgages, and utilities. The goals of the program are to:

- Stabilize individuals and families in their current home.
- Decrease the amount of time families and individuals spend in shelters
- · Help families and individuals secure and maintain affordable housing

Who is eligible for State Homeless Prevention Funds?

- Households in imminent danger of eviction, homelessness, or foreclosure. (Households are ineligible if they have started the foreclosure process.)
- Households that are currently experiencing homelessness. These ho document the ability to afford rent and utilities in the future without assistance All households must be able to document a temporary economic crisis beyond their
- - o Loss of employmen
 - Medical disability or emergence
 - Loss or delay of a public benefit
 - Substantial change in household comp Victimization by criminal activity
 - Illegal action by a landlord
 - Displacement by government or private action

What types of assistance are available?

- iseholds may receive no more than once instance of assistance (up to \$2,500 depending on need) during a 24-month period.
- Payments can't exceed 3 months of rent or mortgage arrears Payments can't exceed 2 months of rent or mortgage assistance

- Utility bills can be paid up to the cap of \$2500, but clients should focus on what it will cost to stop the shut-off and get on a payment plan.

How can someone access State Homeless Prevention Funds? Potential clients can call (773)291-1086 and ask for "short-term help."
